Chichlowska, formerly Raymond, Ph.D., MPH, is enrolled in the Colville Confederated Tribes from her father Glenn Raymond and is a descendant of the Spokane nation from her mother Charlene Teters. She received her master's of public health degree in Epidemiology and Biostatistics at Boston University in 2005, her doctoral degree from the Department of Epidemiology at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (UNC-CH) in May 2009 and is the Director of the California Tribal Epidemiology Center. Her research interests include health disparities. Beginning in September 2002, she worked at the Office of Health Disparities, National Center for HIV, STDs, and TB Prevention, Centers for Disease Control (CDC) in Atlanta, Georgia on a one-year fellowship. From 2003 through 2008, via funding on NIH Research Supplements for Underrepresented Minorities, she has engaged in research focusing on the role of discrimination in racial/ethnic health disparities and examined the effect of socioeconomic status on the metabolic syndrome. She was a Sequoyah Dissertation Fellow of the Society of Fellows at UNC-CH during her final year (2008-2009) which allowed her to complete her doctoral research on cardiovascular disease, its subclinical manifestations, and electrocardiographic risk factors. She and her husband Maciej recently relocated from North Carolina to California with their 9-month old daughter Monika Eve.
